

CEFA has planned a number of exciting new initiatives for 2015 in celebration of the 800th birthday of Magna Carta; we would welcome your involvement.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

I congratulate all our wonderful CEFA supporters, partners and benefactors as we celebrate ten years of schools'activities, projects and programs "Educating for Democracy". Together we can continue to make a difference as proud Australians. We are promoting the history, heritage and workings of what I proudly consider to be the best democracy in today's world.

CEFA has, November 28, 2014, finalised for the Australian Government a proposal to establish an educational digital interactive Australian Constitution Centre (ACC). Our report research shows that despite many millions of dollars spent annually for over 20 years on excellent resources, museum displays, events and activities, just 60% of Australians say democracy is preferable to any other kind of government and only 39% recognise this who are aged 18-29.

It is now a national imperative to improve our knowledge of, and engagement with, the history and operation of our Australian Constitution. We hope our shared values, such as our freedoms that are balanced by our rights and responsibilities under our Rule of Law, will be better understood in the next 10 years. This will then translate to measurable changes and improvements in attitudes towards our system of government.

Through a coming together, we will galvanise Australians including students, teachers and the general public who are currently cynical, apathetic and disengaged. The ACC will collaborate with outstanding Australian institutions including the Museum of Australian Democracy at Old Parliament House (MoAD/OPH) and National Archives of Australia (NAA). The proposed referendum on constitutional recognition of the Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Peoples will give us the opportunity for public conversations on a major contemporary constitutional issue. This discourse should occur in the spirit of a fair go that has permeated our peaceful federation since 1901.

Together we can make a difference, educating and engaging on and with our system of government and governance, telling the story of its history and heritage and exploring the contemporary relevance of the Australian Constitution.

Let's face this challenge together through educating for democracy.



CEFA recognizes that each school is unique and requires a tailored process for their own school or class parliament. Mr Eaton stated "Melville Primary School [Perth, WA] decided to allow the year 6 and 7 students to elect their Prime Minister, Deputy Prime Minister and Ministers together with Deputy Ministers". He added "this process involved electioneering activities such as speeches, posters and preferential voting and those elected are responsible for carrying out various functions around the school in the various ministries formed". He also advised that they have the Sport, Health, Justice, Finance, Education, Environment, and Communication ministries each with a Minister, Deputy Minister and 7 advisers.

Students from Balmain Public School opened their CEFA School Parliament with their first sitting on Monday September 6, 2010.

Teacher and librarian, Ms Margaret Stone, was the speaker for the session which saw members discussing issues ranging from using more recycled paper in the school to budget management and new uses of technology at the school with individual flair and style.




